Whether you're getting close to making the decision or you already did, one question is likely going through your mind: "Where am I going to put it?"

Site selection and preparation are two of the top questions asked by spa buyers. It is very important for the structural integrity of the spa and it is very important for the quality of the spa experience.

Research shows that when the spa is close to the house, you will use it more often. The further away it is from the house, the less you tend to use it. Be practical and consider how you can integrate your new spa into your personal lifestyle so that you can make the most of your spa investment.

If you have a peaceful, relaxing garden, you may want to place the spa there, so as to create the most relaxing environment possible. Or perhaps you

built or reinforced a deck on which you can place the spa, or maybe you had a concrete slab poured especially for it.. Think about how and where you want to use your spa.



Delivering a spa to the perfect backyard retreat.

Most factory recommendations suggest you place your spa on a concrete slab or structural deck. If those spas are not placed properly, the spa warranty is affected. It is important to know what the spa manufacturer recommends; this can be different with each manufacturer.

With spas that are built with the proper base construction techniques, it is possible to set the spa on something other than concrete or a deck, such as crushed rock where the ground surface has been properly leveled and prepared. A non-wood structure with a plastic base won't be affected by water intrusion and structurally spreads the spa's load over the entire base.

In planning ground preparation, the power supply must also be a consideration. Where is the power coming from? How does the power enter the spa? With spas that are not foam filled, it is easier to bring power from wherever you want.

You can spend hundreds, if not thousands, on patios, decks, and landscaping in your yard. Protect that investment, and make your spa environment the best for you. Plan for the site very carefully. Visualize how the spa will look and how you will use it. Ask questions. All of this will be worth it to create that magic setting that becomes very personal to you: your personal retreat in your own yard.
